Royally Celebrating 40 years of Costume-Con

Happy New Year! As we begin a new year all of us are looking forward to having the first in person Costume-Con since 2020. Everyone has been working hard to make Costume-Con 40, "Rogues, Royals, and Renegades" one to remember.

In addition to the usual line up of events, the Sci-fi/Fantasy and Historical Masquerades, panels and workshops, and the Friday Night Social, we will be hosting entrants from the CC38 Single Pattern and Future Fashion Show. We want to make note that the CC38 Single Pattern Contest and Future Fashion Show will be on Friday at the Friday Night Social. The CC40 Single Pattern Contest and Future Fashion Show will be on early on Sunday Morning before tech rehearsal for the Historical Masquerade.

There is also the Doll contest, Quilt competition, and especially for CC40 a Face Mask contest, and a Tiara Contest.



If you're more interested in historical costume than fantasy or science fiction costume (or you just want to do it all), on Sunday, the Historical Masquerade lets you present a costume completely accurate to the garments you're reproducing or the period you're working in (e.g., 15th century Renaissance Italy), from the skin out, or one that visibly departs from a period in order to capture a "special" look (e.g., a Starfleet officer in 15th Century Renaissance Italy). They're two separate entry categories (historical dress vs. historical interpretation)! Or, of course, you could present entries in each category if you can find a second body. The judges will review your documentation and your workmanship as well as your stage presentation - you could wind up with three awards for one entry!

For anyone who is interested in doing more than just Costume-Con, the hotel is located a block away

from the North Bethesda Metro
Station that can take you to all the
attractions in Washington D.C.
Costume-Con also falls within the
time for the National Cherry
Blossom Festival and we will make
sure to have the schedule of events
available. Because of the hotel's
location in downtown Rockville
there are also plenty of dining
options to fit any budget.

Costumes and Costumers of the 1960s

(UPDATED) Costuming and Cosplay are not a recent thing. Convention costuming really started at the first Worldcon in 1939 (NYcon 1), when Myrtle ("Morojo") Douglas dressed herself and her then-boyfriend Forrest ("Forry") J. Ackerman in costumes inspired by the 1936 movie *Things to Come*.

But costuming really took off at conventions in the 1960s, paving the path to become the huge
